


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In February 2018, the Record Office for Leicestershire, Leicester and Rutland was awarded a grant by the Heritage Lottery Fund for a project to mark the centenary of women first obtaining the vote in parliamentary elections. Working with pupils from Robert Smyth Academy in Market Harborough, the project set out to commemorate six lesser known local figures who were involved in the fight for votes for women. Through workshops at the Record Office, visits to the Women's History Library in London and to the Houses of Parliament, the pupils were introduced to historical sources for the lives of the men and women who today are largely forgotten. This exhibition showcases some of the work by the pupils and celebrates the lives of these 'Forgotten Champions'.

When Emily Davison threw herself in front of the King's horse in the Derby at Epsom on 4th June 1913, she became a martyr for the cause of women's suffrage. Thousands of women, including women from Leicestershire, took part in her funeral procession. The fact that her collision with the horse was actually recorded on film has ensured that her sacrifice is still remembered today. ### Visit to the Houses of Parliament, 18th June 2018


After a tour of the Houses of Parliament, pupils enjoyed a question and answer session with Neil O'Brien, MP for Harborough.





#### Visit to the Women's History Library, London School of Economics, 18th June 2018


